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FLORIDA TRIPLE CROWN

2nd leg - Edison Sailing Center, Ft. Myers, FL November 20-21, 2004 *Mark Bryant*

On a warm sunny day (83 degrees) 7 teams from around Florida and 1 from Colorado (Steve Davis) gathered for a great event on the Caloosahatchee River off downtown Ft. Myers. Davis says it was to get more experience sailing with Travis for the upcoming Worlds. I think it's because snow with 10 degrees in Denver isn't fun anymore.

Racing starting at noon so our friends from Tampa and Miami could drive to Ft. Myers on Saturday morning. All arrived safe and sound. The wind, well, we had wind out of the South, which meant the breeze was coming across the river with the skyline causing some small shifts of around 20-40 degrees. Sort of like the NA's this year.

The coolest thing at this event was Edison Sailing Center providing 3 juniors as crews and/or skippers, and most of the race committee were also junior sailors. The exceptions were Steve Olive (head coach at ESC) and our Lightning friend John Hughes. The mark setting boats and scoring were provided by JUNIORS. This was a great effort from Edison Sailing and it was a lot of fun. Although Jeff Linton, AKA "the candy boat" may have received special treatment at a few starts. How did he get Mark Taylor to let go of that Snickers bar anyways?

The teams launched and started racing. To no one's surprise team Linton dominated early, winning the first two races. Jeff says this was due to understanding which way the current was going (more on that later). Denver Davis is very competitive with a 2 & 3. Mauk/Bryant have brain failure with 5 & 2 (and that 5 was lucky). Race 3 is a real battle with Mauk/Bryant, Linton and Denver Davis battling all the way. Mauk/Bryant win and Linton pulls a really nasty gybe and half on Denver Davis to get second.

The kids are performing at a high level but not me. Denver Davis smokes us downwind and so does Bill Johns of Miami. Linton is 5th out of 7. Just like Buffalo.

The fifth race Saturday is another duel between TL, DD and Bryant. This one is different because Linton has learned how to sail high, Davis is conquering reaching and I'm stuck between the two of them. Not an ideal spot.

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President's Column

For those of you who were not at the Meetings at St. Pete., here are the highlights:

• Membership is UP

• Our operating income was positive (just barely) but still a large POSITIVE move over last year.

• The proposed changes to the class' governing documents PASSED which will make it easier for people to sail.

• The next couple of NAs and Worlds are scheduled – Get ready, looks like we are off to the WEST COAST for 2006 NAs.

• The video will be sold by retailers and other classes

• Kip reported his findings on the class office. He started his report with "After having talked with lots of other classes, this class is in FAR BETTER SHAPE overall than any other class". On the class office he made the following key points:

* The class offices serve two functions – administrative and marketing.

* Classes that tried to perform these functions solely with volunteers could not sustain a effective class office

- * Having a third party run the class office has its share of pros/cons and is not a clear choice.
- A number of proposals were discussed. Some modifications of these proposals will be voted on this summer.

The one that you need to think about and discuss with your governing board members is: How much control should be given to the organizing body of non-sanctioned regattas (local versus international control)? Think of this issue as the difference between federal and state laws. The ILCA is governed by an international body ISAF.

Should the ILCA allow local fleets more control over what makes

sense for their sailing venue for nonsanctioned regattas so as to promote more people sailing Lightnings? Currently, if a fleet holds a non-sanctioned regatta that varies in any way from the documents governing the ILCA, that fleet can be disbanded by the ILCA. The Executive Committee or Measurement

Committee cannot allow permanent changes to the governing documents. So technically, sailing with two is a violation, the short boards that NJ used are in violation – the governing documents do not allow the class to make this legal.

Based on input from the Advisory Board and others, the recommendations are:

- •To provide fleets with the authority to vary from the governing documents for non-sanctioned regattas provided that the change:
- * Does not cause a competitor to be disadvantaged or advantaged in any way.
- * Does not change the fundamental design of the boat such as sails, hull, deck, mast, foils, etc.
- Allow a body such as the Governing Board to vote on exceptions that impact the fundamental design of the boat. For example: kick up rudders that were allowed for some areas in the US and Nigeria.

Special thanks needs to go to Fisk Hayden for so many years creating such a strong Southern Circuit Heritage that so many participated in.

Chief Measurer's Column

I have just returned from a wonderful Southern Circuit. The race committees did a great job of getting all the scheduled races in, and sailing conditions were fine most of the time!

I would like to thank the sailors who gave me input through the Lightning L-list as well as many emails regarding the changes in the Specifications regarding the use of the BAR on the shrouds to allow older boats to be set up by the sail makers' standards for new boats. Due to your input this passed by a nearly unanimous vote. The Specification and By-Law change to allow a different sail number other than the hull number to be used also passed both the Governing Board and the General Meeting. Again thanks to all of you who asked for the change and those who helped me get it done. My thanks also go to Jim Carson who helped with the wording of the requested changes.

At this point I have been asked to rewrite the Specifications to make them clearer and eliminate redundancy between the Specifications



and the Rules Governing. If there is anyone out there familiar with these documents and would like to give me a hand and/or some advice about this, please let me know what you could do for me as well as the Class.

It has been brought to my attention that some boats have been sailed without having a number engraved permanently marked in the starboard side of the centerboard trunk. Please be advised this is not to happen in the Lightning Class. It is strictly forbidden to be sailing in a

Lightning race in a boat that has not been properly manufactured and delivered or sailed without a number and a Measurement Certificate on file or at least pending at the Lightning Class Office.

Another item brought up at the Southern Circuit was the use of graphics on the spinnaker. This is strictly forbidden in our rules and specifications. No graphics my be displayed on a spinnaker except the number, royalty sticker and the sailmaker's emblem. Sails will not be measured at the NA's nor Worlds that have graphics of any kind on them. I know that there have been some in the past but we have rules and its my job to see that they are followed, so please have your spinnaker without graphics at the NA's.

Again thanks for all of your input. Please keep coming up with new ideas and if we need to change rules to keep up with the times we will.

OFFICIAL NOTICES

All proposed amendments to the Specifications were approved at the Governing Board Meeting. All proposed amendments to the By-Laws were approved at the General Meeting. See below. Complete Minutes of these meetings will be published next month.

District Secretaries: Please send complete District schedules to the Class office. Please include date, venue and contact information.

Fleet Secretaries: Remember that Fleet Dues are due in January of each year. Next month we will publish a list of fleets automatically suspended for non-payment of dues. Fleet dues are \$25 per year.

APPROVED AMENDMENTS to SPECIFICATIONS ARTICLE I, HULL

Amend Paragraph 46 as follows (<u>new wording underlined</u>):

46. The upper shrouds shall be attached to the chain plates at a point no further forward than 584.2 mm (23") from the leading edge of the centerboard pin. The lower shrouds shall be attached to the chainplates at a point 304.80 mm (12") to 355.60 mm (14") aft of the upper shroud chainplate. There shall be no more than one upper and lower shroud chainplate on each side of the boat.

On boats built prior to January
1st, 1985, a bar may be permanently
attached to the existing chainplates
to extend the point of shroud attachment within the limits and restrictions specified. Such alteration shall
receive Measurement Committee
approval and be noted on the
Measurement Certificate.

ARTICLE V, SAILS

Amend Paragraph 75. as follows (new wording underlined):

Racing numbers and the Class emblem will be on both sides of the main sail, and be located above the middle batten as per Plans, and racing numbers with an optional class emblem will be on the spinnaker. Numbers will be 304.80 mm (12") minimum height and 203.20 mm (8") wide except for the numeral one. International events shall be identified by nationality as defined by the ISAF. The sail number that is assigned to the boat at the time of construction is the hull number. This specification is modified by the bylaws racing restriction. The use of numbers is subject to the By-Laws Racing Restriction and may not be arbitrary. All sail numbers are to be of a solid color contrasting with the sail material.

APPROVED AMENDMENT to BY-LAWS ARTICLE VIII, RACING RESTRICTIONS

Amend Paragraph 4 as follows (<u>new wording underlined</u>):

4. No sails other than approved jib, mainsail, and spinnaker can be used. Mainsail and spinnaker must carry the number of the sailboat. A different number may be used if properly obtained by the user, applied as required by the Specifications, and subject to requirements detailed in Notices of Race and Rules Governing Sanctioned Regattas.

Getting Started in Sailboat Racing

FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE Now Anybody Can Get Involved in Sailboat Racing

Chicago, IL—February 11, 2005—To the uninitiated, sailboat racing can appear both complicated and intimidating. And that's too bad, because there's no better way to hone your sailing skills—whether you're a veteran cruiser or just starting out

Luckily, for those who have been toying with the idea of getting into the mix, there is now the book GETTING STARTED IN SAILBOAT RACING, published by International Marine/McGraw-Hill, which takes the mystery out of the sport so anybody can get out on the race course, no matter what kind of boat they sail

Written with the beginner in mind, the book breaks the sport down into easy-tounderstand chapters that reflect the makeup of a typical race. There's a chapter on starting, followed by chapters on the windward leg, mark rounding, downwind legs and finishing. Chapters on the rules, boat speed and weather round out the subject.

Dozens of diagrams and photographs help illustrate everything from boat handling to tactics. Perhaps most importantly, a chap-

ter entitled "Getting Involved" explains how to find racing opportunities in your area—something that is much easier than a lot of sailors might think.

"Our goal was to make the sport accessible to sailors who are interested in trying racing but aren't sure how to get started," said Richard Stearns, a veteran sailmaker, boatbuilder, national champion in the Tartan Ten class, and the main trimmer for the Heart of America America's Cup campaign. "We've covered everything a sailor needs to be both safe and competitive on the race course. Once you get comfortable with racing you can move on to things like higher-level tactics and wringing out that last fraction of a knot of boat speed."

Stearns noted that, because of its emphasis on the fundamentals, the book also serves as an excellent resource for sailors who already have a few seasons worth of campaigning under their belt.

"I had one skipper tell me it helped remind him of some of the basics of the sport that he'd forgotten. He then bought copies for every member of his crew," Stearns said

Entertaining as well as informative, the book uses anecdotes and case studies to breathe life into the basic theory of the



sport. It also makes a point of reminding sailors not to take themselves too seriously, emphasizing that, when all is said and done, sailboat racing is about having a good time out on the water.

"Despite the fact that they are among the most beautiful things created by man...sailboats can turn the nicest people into ogres, which is too bad," they write. "Whatever you do, don't ever let sailing ruin your day. Life is too short. The simple fact that you're getting to play the game is pretty cool."

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A. Lightning Tapered Spinnaker Pole

Tapered poles are stiffer and stronger than straight tubes, and they allow you to use smaller, and therefore lighter, pole ends. The pole is shown here with Proctor ends, but other ends are available. Note on measuring for your Lightning pole: Lightnings measure their poles from the front of the mast. So, we will need to factor in the distance your particular ring adds to the equation. Just measure from the front surface of your mast to the outside surface of your ring, where the pole will be pressing. We'll do the rest of the math. Call us for more

B. Bailers

Shown here are the Super Max and New Large. The New Large fits many older boats; the Super Max fits many newer boats. Inside or outside mounting is the key difference. In the spring, put a little "Vaseline" on the gaskets to keep things running smoothly. If your bailers are leaking, you can try replacing the gaskets.

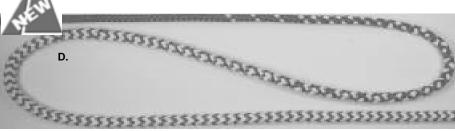
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BOTTOM JOB Adventures in Wooden Boating

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It is a truth universally acknowledged, that a wooden Lightning in possession of a good bottom must be in want of an owner.

However, the big question is, who will that lucky owner be?

Readers may recall that I found myself in quite a pickle last fall after I announced -- or maybe I should say "confessed" -- that I'd bought yet another wooden Lightning.

Rightfully so. I mean, who needs two Lightnings, anyway?

I failed to sell myself on the need for this second boat, let alone the person of higher authority in our house who reviews such decisions.

I decided to mend my ways as quickly as I could.

Is it true that I only think of material things?

If so, I planned to prove it could be otherwise.

I would jettison this particular material Lightning ASAP.

It just happened that a sailor friend at work had been asking me to help him find a low-priced Lightning that he could sail on Lake St. Clair.

Now I needed his help.

John, I said, how'd you like to buy a good woodie?

I quoted a bargain price.

And I described Lightning number 6402 to him.

But I have to admit, my heart was not in this attempted sale.

And when my friend, a fellow amateur radio operator, asked if I'd be willing to take some ham radio equipment in trade, I demurred.

Cold cash is the stuff of which old Lightnings, particularly ones with good bottoms, must be transacted.

Over the winter, I fantasized how 6402 would look in a pretty new coat of light green, or maybe burgundy, paint.

The dumbest thing I did was to get in touch with the man who restored 6402.

Readers may recall that when he pitched this sale to me last fall, Brian Nickels repeated the mantra, "He did it right."

"He" is Robert Colwell, who sold 6402 to Brian.

Brian didn't want the boat. He only wanted the new Nickels Lightning trailer underneath 6402.

According to Bob Colwell of Davison, Mich., Brian assured him he would not junk the woodie.

"He told me he knew somebody who loved wooden boats," Bob told me. "That really made me happy."

I suspect that somebody was none other than I.

And I did indeed buy the boat, mostly for its bottom.

The bottom Bob Colwell did right.

That purchase led to the argument with my wife and an even bigger dispute that still goes on in my head.

On the one hand, I hear my own voice saying how silly it is to own two Lightnings with two sets of license fees, plus additional winter and summer storage costs; repairs, upgrades times two.

But oh boy, he sure did it right with that bottom.

The boat was destined to become a fixture in a restaurant when Bob bought it for \$450 in the early 1990s. He thought a little varnish on the interior was all it needed.

Instead, he removed and replaced half of the bottom frames. The boat is a 1956 Nickels & Holman, and it was double-planked with a western red cedar inner layer and mahogany outer layer. The boat had been fiberglassed. Water snuck between the glass and the mahogany, rotting the latter.

Bob spent \$1,800 on Honduran mahogany, epoxy, stainless steel fasteners and paint. He scrapped the old mahogany. The western red cedar planks were still good. He encapsulated them in epoxy and screwed them to the frames. Then he epoxied new Honduran mahogany planks to the cedar and spent many hours fairing the bottom.

His father-In-law, Don Wrocklage of Burton, Mich., let him use his garage and spent many hours sanding the bottom.

That's how the bottom was done right.

Hearing that, and Bob's claim that the bottom doesn't leak, how could I possibly think of selling this boat?

Let me tell you about an email I received recently. It came from a

A good reason for not having two Lightnings: I'm buying a scale model of a Lightning.

Well, it's not exactly one of those radio control Lightning models.

But a Lightning it is not.

Therefore, I will not be the owner of two Lightnings, after all.
