HOW TO FULLY ENJOY THE CALIFORNIA CIRCUIT

During the 2000 California Circuit I learned several valuable lessons on how to fully enjoy a regatta. LESSON #1: You have to get out here and sail the California Circuit! 14 races over five days in 4 different venues, beautiful weather, perfect winds, and a whole new group of Lightning sailors to meet. Folks came from Oregon, Washington, Colorado, Michigan, Missouri, and of course all the locals. Matt Burridge and Dan Moriarty flew in from St. Louis to join me on a boat borrowed from Kirk and Edna Johnson. After winning this first regatta, we were lounging in our lawn chairs, very content with our 1,1,2,1,3 finishes, and I quickly learned LESSON #2: Bring more than three lawn chairs! You see, there is something about chairs that makes people want to hang out, and a few extra would be nice. This makes it much easier to get to know the 27 other Lightning sailors at this regatta.

Tuesday was a layday and allowed for a quick drive down to San Diego. We rolled in to Coronado Yacht Club and quickly set up the boat with Carlos Santana blasting, then we lounged in our lawn chairs. The plan was to go sailing around San Diego Bay to get ready for the next day's Marathon race. However, we now had extra chairs, and everyone kept coming by and hanging out. So we spent a beautiful sunny afternoon lounging, laughing, drinking beer, sipping rum and getting to know more of our new Lightning friends. LESSON #3: If you have extra chairs, you run out of beer sooner!

Wednesday morning started with some bad news. Our third crew couldn't make the race because of work. Despite about fifty phone calls, Dan and I couldn't dig one up, so we were ordered to carry a huge cooler full of beer for weight. The twentytwo mile marathon race is truly a unique and challenging event. The first hour was upwind from the middle of San Diego Bay. Sunny skies, winds were very steady at 8-10 knots and the fleet stayed tight.

We got into a little duel with the team of Dr. Joel Humphrey, Mark Allen, Mark Dan Wray. "the pincher" was driving our boat and was right at home in the flat water as we had the lead near the bay entrance. As we sailed out of the harbor, we could see the bank fog

rolling over Point Loma, very ominous. The winds accelerate around the point and the next thirty minutes was a screaming spinnaker reach as we headed out into the Pacific.


The next challenge was to determine which of the dozen government marks was the turning mark. LESSON #4: Studying the NOAA chart for an hour last night pays off big! Apparently a few boats behind us didn't get lesson #4 and sailed well below our course to the wrong mark. We were very nervous, since they were the locals! I swore to Danny that we were right, and soon we rounded with a fourminute lead! The next two hours was a beat up the coast; a game of "get as close to shore as you dare to escape the current, but beware THE KELP BEDS!" Scott Finkboner, with crew Tom Davies and Jill Carman went way inshore, and seemed to be gaining on us. We try to cover, but keep getting caught in the kelp. We learned later that Scott had mapped out the kelp the day before! This would be LESSON #5.

This whole time we watch Gerry Neuberger, sailing with Sandra Neuberger and Dan Burton, stay a little offshore and grab the lead. Suddenly we are caught inside a large wave (call it "surf" at this point!) and have a sixfoot breaker barreling down at us! We foot off for speed to "punchthrough," but white water crashes over the boat about chest high. Danny gets thrown against the afterdeck, I cling to the shrouds. Then the boat drops out from under us and lands with a tremendous bang! We are both stunned but the boat stays intact (thank you Dave Nickels!) The Neubergers saw the whole thing and got to view most of our centerboard!

LESSON #6: Don't follow Finkboner unless you know what you are doing!

We open the bailers, hike hard, sail fast, and retake the lead just before the last turning mark. The sun comes back out for the reach into Mission Bay. A little chug on the "jugorum" and then pop the chute. We feel very lucky to have all nine spinnakers behind us! Soon we cross the finish line in front of the club with the smell of chili cooking! The rum is quickly finished. Neuberger is 2nd, Finkboner 3rd; Joel Humphrey is 4th, followed by Mike Brewer who, I believe, sailed the entire race shirtless! John DeBenedetti is 6th, Al Poindexter 7th, then Dave Webber 8th, Steven Davis 9th, and Wendell Harter in 10th. If you have never done distance racing in a Lightning, it is a blast, and you have to get out here and try it!

EVENT #3, "The Ocean Series". It was my turn to drive again, and our third was Paul Galvez, a nimble sailor who taught me how to sail an 114. Three great races, long windwardleeward. The second race featured an exciting downwind duel between us and Mark Allen that made the Prada/ America One duels look like child's play. Gerry Neuberger, last year's circuit winner, had fixed his tuning problems from King Harbor and had great boat speed. A win in race two put Gerry one point behind us, with Mark Allen another point back going into the final race. Gerry rolled over us at the start but then turned around to restart, allowing us to grab the bullet and our third "event win." We were done early enough for some extracurricular activities; the Michigan group went surfing! That evening, Scott Finkboner prepared an amazing meal of teriyaki grilled Mahi Mahi. LESSON #7: Scott makes the best Mahi Mahi in the world; this alone would make

Final day, five races inside Mission Bay. Danny "the pincher" drove this one; our third was Yvonne Galvez, another I14 sailor. Courses were short so the fleet stayed very tight; this was the most competitive racing of the Circuit. We stumbled in the early races with finishes of 3,3,2 thanks to being over early and a spectacular capsize trying to get the chute down after a downwind finish.

Gerry Neuberger had three bullets and looked untouchable. We won the last two races and watched Al Poindexter come within a half boat length of spoiling Gerry's day. Gerry held onto a 4,3 to win the tiebreaker for the Bay Series.

At the awards ceremony, Dan finally wore his "Make 7, Up Yours" tee shirt as we accepted a truckload of trophies for the 2000 California Circuit! Second overall were coskippers. Joel

Humphrey and Mark Allen. In third was Scott Finkboner. Problems with a new mast in King Harbor kept Gerry Neuberger back in fourth. Al Poindexter, sailing with Edrie Romans and Derek Poindexter rounded out the top five. Our capsize did win us the "bowling trophy;" this was the first time this award went to the Circuit winners! The Susan M. Arnold trophy for the highest placing woman sailing every race, went to Sandra Neuberger.

Many thanks to all who helped organize this event, King Harbor YC, Coronado YC and Mission Bay YC. Special thanks to Kirk and Edna Johnson for lending us their boat, I'm sure they enjoyed watching it win. The California Circuit is truly a "must do,, event; it was great getting to know all the new faces out here. Don't forget LESSON #1:YOU HAVE TO GET OUT HERE AND SAIL THE CALIFORNIA CIRCUIT!

Octavo puesto: (Ecuador)Juan Santos Jr., Miguel Mardonez, Enrique Granja Jr. edades 16 anos Noveno puesto: (Peru) Dereck Marston, Leglie Marston.

Noveno puesto: (Peru) Dereck Marston, Leslie Marston, Rafael Verand edades 17 anos.

De los 19 botes participantes, 11 tripulaciones estaban totalmente compuestas por menores de 22 anos.

KIDS TAKE CHARGE IN SOUTH AMERICA

Salinas Yacht Club, Salinas, Ecuador, April 2022 The 45th South American Championship was held in Salinas, Ecuador on April 2022. For the first time we tried a boatrotation system, similar to the one used at the Youth Worlds. We decided to try this format because it is very difficult and costly to transport boats around. Also, by rotating boats all teams, both locals and visitors, would have equal opportunity.

The purpose of the regatta was to increase participation from all countries, and to motivate kids to sail Lightnings. Thus, each country was allowed to bring one youth team and two senior teams. Just looking at the attendance we feel that the regatta format was a success: all countries except Brasil showed up with at least two teams: Argentina (2), Chile (3), Colombia (3), Peru (3) and Ecuador (8) for a total of 19 boats, out of which five were youth teams. The system was widely praised by all competitors and it was decided that we should continue to use it in the next South Americans.

Now the most important stuff, results:

Champions: (Colombia) Sebastian Higuera, Nicolas Deeb, Camilo Salcedo 21 years old Runners Up: (Ecuador) Miguel Plaza, Jose Gonzales, Cristian Gonzalez 22 years old Fourth place: (Colombia) Loreana Jacob, Jessica Jacob 17 years old Fifth place: (Ecuador) Carlos Plaza, Santiago Garcia, Alfredo Marin 19 years old Eighth place: (Ecuador) Juan Santos Jr., Miguel Mardonez, Enrique GranjaJr. 16 years old Ninth place: (Peru) Dereck Marston, Leslie Marston, Rafael Verand 17 years old.

Out of the 19 participants, a total of 11 crews were made up completely by kids younger than 22 years.

You'd think these were all inexperienced kids. But then again, Tito Gonzales (CHI) and his world championship crew Pablo and Claus had to fight hard and could only make it to third place after a tight duel with Sebastian Higuera (COL) and Miguel Plaza Jr. (ECU). Also, other seasoned sailors had to give way to the kids, like Juan Santos (ECU) who finished 13th and Hector Longarella (ARG) who finished 14th after having just completed a successful Southern Circuit campaign in which they finished 8th.

These results are very promising for the future of the class in South America. We believe that each District Commodore has a huge responsibility and needs to continue to work very hard to incorporate youth crews to the class, which will guarantee we'll see Lightnings for years to come.

As you can see, the results were super tight and the racing was nose to tail classic Lightning action.


We had a great contingent from Thunder Bay, Winnipeg and Dryden and we would like to thank them for coming all the way down for the event.
